

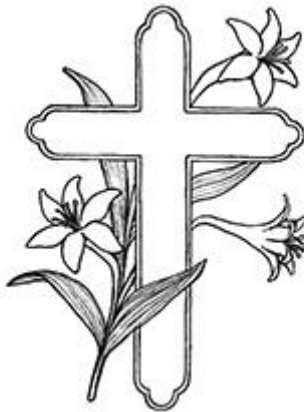

First Lesson

Acts 10:34-43

Peter opened his mouth and said: "Truly I perceive that God shows no partiality, but in every nation any one who fears him and does what is right is acceptable to him. You know the word which he sent to Israel, preaching good news of peace by Jesus Christ (he is Lord of all), the word which was proclaimed throughout all Judea, beginning from Galilee after the baptism which John preached: how God anointed Jesus of Nazareth with the Holy Spirit and with power; how he went about doing good and healing all that were oppressed by the devil, for God was with him. And we are witnesses to all that he did both in the country of the Jews and in Jerusalem. They put him to death by hanging him on a tree; but God raised him on the third day and made him manifest; not to all the people but to us who were chosen by God as witnesses, who ate and drank with him after he rose from the dead. And he commanded us to preach to the people, and to testify that he is the one ordained by God to be judge of the living and the dead. If for this life only we have hoped in Christ, we are of all men most to be pitied. But in fact Christ has been raised from the dead, the first fruits of those who have fallen asleep. For as by a man came death, by a man has come also the resurrection of the dead. For as in Adam all die, so also in Christ shall all be made alive. But each in his own order: Christ the first fruits, then at his coming those who belong to Christ. Then comes the end, when he delivers the kingdom to God the Father after destroying every rule and every authority and power. For he must reign until he has put all his enemies under his feet. The last enemy to be destroyed is death.



- 1. The Host alone, receive the Host into your outstretched hands, and then return to your seat.**
- 2. The Host and the Wine, by intinction. The ministers will place a Host which has been dipped into the Precious Blood directly on your tongue. Indicate this by simply resting your folded hands on the communion rail, and afterward return to your seat.**
- 3. The Host and the Chalice, by drinking: Receive the Host into your outstretched hands, then remain at the rail for the minister to present the Chalice.**

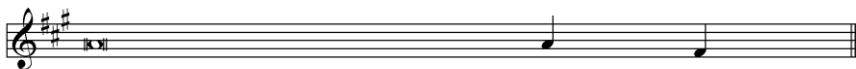

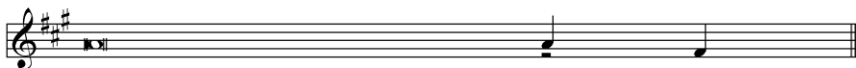

WELCOME TO SAINT JOHN'S CHURCH

SAINT JOHN'S CHURCH was founded in the City of Passaic in 1859. Since that time the congregation has had only two homes. The first church edifice was a modest carpenter gothic structure built in 1861 approximately two blocks from here on Prospect Street. The building in which you are standing was built in 1894 in the Norman Gothic style with influence from the William Morris School, also known as the Arts and Craft Movement, by the prominent Newark architect William Halsey Wood. No major changes have been made to the building since (with the exception of the addition of the Parish House in 1907) although many gifts presented over the years have served to beautify this holy place.
