



Celebrant: ■ Behold the Lamb of God. Behold Him that takes away the sins of the world.

Response: Lord, I am not worthy that You should come under my roof, but speak the word only and my soul shall be healed.

All baptized Christians who may receive Holy Communion in their own churches are most welcome to receive the Blessed Sacrament here also. Because of ongoing Covid precautions, you may do so in one of three ways:

- 1. <u>The Host alone</u>, receive the Host into your outstretched hands, and then return to your seat.
- 2. <u>The Host and the Wine</u>, by intinction. The ministers will place a Host which has been dipped into the Precious Blood directly on your tongue. Indicate this by simply resting your folded hands on the communion rail, and afterward return to your seat.
- 3. <u>The Host and the Chalice</u>, by drinking: Receive the Host into your outstretched hands, then remain at the rail for the minister to present the Chalice.

BENEDICTION OF THE BLESSED SACRAMENT

When the procession has returned to the Sanctuary and the Sacrament placed on the Altar, we pray for ourselves and others silently. Short prayers are then offered by the Priest.

The congregation remains kneeling and, after the Intercessions, is sung:

The Priest gives the Blessing (or Benediction) in silence, making the sign of the Cross with the monstrance over the kneeling congregation.

At the foot of the Altar the Priest recites each line of the **Divine Praises** and it is immediately repeated by the Congregation.

Blessed be the great Mother of God, Mary most holy.

Blessed be her holy and Immaculate Conception.

Blessed be her Glorious Assumption.

Blessed be the name of Mary, Virgin and Mother.

Blessed be Saint Joseph, her most chaste spouse.

Blessed be God in his Angels and in his Saints.

Priest: May Jesus in the Most Blessed Sacrament be praised, adored, and loved with grateful affection at every moment in all the tabernacles of the world even to the end of time. **Amen.**

As soon as the Priest has replaced the Blessed Sacrament in the tabernacle, **all stand** and the choir sings:


